









November, the signs of the coming Christmas season are everywhere to be seen; Christmas lights are already in place and twinkling in town-centres; shop windows are full of Christmas displays aimed at attracting early Christmas shoppers young and old; even in our own churchyard Christmas trees are already in place and the glass-fronted cabinet by the side of the church door is there ready and waiting to be populated by the characters of the Nativity. Hardly surprising then that one of our local supermarkets has adopted, I notice, as its Christmas by-line the phrase 'Christmas has arrived'. "And ahead of time", some of us might groan, whilst nevertheless joining in the mad and merry dash towards 25th December. Yes, love it or hate it, Christmas is coming and nothing is

going to stop it!

The old nursery rhyme with which I prefaced my remarks, however, seems to me to sound a more serious note when it goes on to urge us to put a penny, or indeed a half-penny, in the old man's hat. The old man is presumably a beggar and as such reminds us that as we enter the flurry of preparations for Christmas, we should be mindful of those in our world, in our nation and in our own community for whom the prospect of Christmas is daunting and challenging; mindful of those for whom at Christmas there will be no shelter, no warmth, no food, no cheer. It is for such communities and individuals that the nursery rhyme urges us to have a care, to spare even a very small amount, even, if you like, a modest 'ha'penny'. None of us can possibly respond to the many competing good causes which appeal for our support at Christmas, but we can all surely respond in a positive, albeit modest way, to at least one local, regional, national or indeed international organisation whose work we feel disposed to support.

But we need also to remember that there are many people whose needs are not material – the chronically and terminally ill, the old and infirm confined to their homes, the destitute, the lonely, the bereaved, those whose lives for whatever reason have fallen apart. Such people do not need our 'penny' or our 'half-penny' but rather a little of our precious time in and around the Christmas season. Important, therefore, as the mad busy-ness of the festive season overtakes us, that we should not forget those for whom the best of Christmas presents might be an hour of our time.

Finally, however, in our wish to be supportive of those in need, we ourselves need to be sensitive and remember that there are indeed those who genuinely wish to be left alone, even at Christmas-time, and that we do them no favours if we seek to coerce them into unwanted festive merriment.

It comes at a pivotal point in the story when the male lead, Tony, realises his gang warfare lifestyle isn't for him anymore and looks with anticipation and hope for a better future. He feels that there's an opportunity for change. His heart is preparing for something new.

He sings:

Something's coming...

It doesn't necessarily mean we need to start spending money on it from September, but it does mean that we can be spending our hearts on preparing ourselves for a time of such glorious celebration. Through the season of Advent as we look to the real meaning of Christmas, we prepare ourselves for celebrating something wonderful, something miraculous, something life-changing...

And (unlike in the song) you don't even have to wait for it, because we all know that it has actually already come. Jesus was the one sent to fulfil (as another song goes) 'peace on earth, mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled', and he has the power to transform our hearts with the goodness that he brings. Like Tony sensed in West Side Story, let us sense too... There is an opportunity for change. There is a better future. There is hope. There is a miracle. It is great. It is coming ... to you!

To end, I'm going to jump on the premature bandwagon and remind us of some (more song) words that some of us might not be ready for seasonally, but that echo true throughout the year.


