

On the following morning, 8 June 1924, the summit of Everest was obscured by mist, but toward the middle of the day the mist cleared briefly and members of the wider expeditionary team, observing from far below, caught a brief glimpse of the two men moving slowly upwards at about 1000ft from the mountain summit. Then the mist closed in again and Mallory and Irvine disappeared from view.





for some reason turn back before the summit was reached? And, as they failed to return to their base camp, where and how did they meet their end? Only in 1999 was this last question partially answered, when the body of Mallory was discovered below the summit, preserved by the intense year-round cold of Everest's high slopes. Forensic examination of the body indicated that he had been mortally injured in a fall. The body of Irvine, however, has never been found, so the details of his fate remain to this day unknown.

The big question, however, still remains – did Mallory and Irvine reach the top of the world's highest mountain? It is likely that that is something which will never one way or the other be proved. For the moment, the only possible clue might lie in the fact that Mallory had promised his wife, before setting out on his arduous adventure, that if he got to the summit of Everest, he would leave there the photograph of her and their daughter which he always carried in his wallet. When his body was discovered in 1999, with all his personal belongings still intact, no such photograph was found.

Mount Everest 100th Anniversary

The early days of the month of June see a number of significant anniversaries – the 71st anniversaries of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II on 2 June 1953 and of the news of the conquering of Everest by Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing Norgay which broke on the very same day; the 80th anniversary of the Normandy D-Day landings on 6 June 1944; the 100th anniversary of the ill-fated attempt to reach the summit of Everest by George Mallory and Andrew Irvine on 8 June 1924.

It is possible that on 8 June 2024 only very few will pause to commemorate Mallory and Irvine's epic assault on the summit of Everest 100 years ago, a venture of high courage which cost both men their lives. Indeed, it is more than likely that a majority of people may never have heard of them. So who were these two men who faced the extreme hasards of trying to scale the world's highest mountain peak at a height of 29,035 ft (8,850 meters)?

Both men were the product of upper middle class British families. Mallory, born in 1886, was the son of the Rector of Mobberley,

Cheshire, whilst Irvine, born in 1902 and so some 15 years younger than Mallory, was the son of a family of academics from Birkenhead. Both were educated at public schools – Mallory at Winchester and Irvine at Shrewsbury – and both went on to university – Mallory to study history at Magdalene College, Cambridge, and Irvine to study engineering at Merton College, Oxford.

After university, Mallory, described by contemporaries as having good looks, charm and seemingly unending enthusiasm, became a master at Charterhouse School. He was also closely associated with members of the bohemian Bloomsbury group of intellectuals which included the artists Duncan Grant and Vanessa Bell, the novelist Virginia Woolf, the writer Lytton Strachey and the philosopher and economist John Maynard Keynes. From 1915-1918, he served with distinction as an officer in the British army and fought in the Battle of the Somme. He returned briefly to his teaching post at Charterhouse after the end of World War I, but with his by then undoubted skills and expertise in extreme mountaineering gained in Scotland, Wales, the English Lake District and the Alps, he was enlisted in the 1921 and 1922 British reconnaissance expeditions to Everest and the 1924 expedition which aimed to get men on the summit.

As for Irvine, whilst still an Oxford undergraduate he made his mark as a precocious and inventive young engineer. He was also an outstanding sportsman and rower, being a member of the 1922 and 1923 Oxford boat crews and a member of the Oxford Mountaineering Club where he proved himself to have high potential as a climber. It is thought, however, that it was primarily for his engineering skills and his ability to resolve technical challenges that he was included in the 1924 Everest expedition and was chosen by Mallory to join him on the assault of the summit.

So it was that on the morning of 7 June 1924 these two men set out for the expedition's advanced base camp from where the next day they would make their attempt to be the first known human beings to reach the summit of the world's highest mountain. Photographs of the two of them show that by twenty-first-century standards they were ill-shod and inadequately dressed to withstand the extremes of cold they were set to experience.

Letter from The Curate

Dear friends,

much healing, peace and restoration.

As I write, I sit under a blanket by a cup of honey and lemon nursing a cold. Apart from the hot drink, something that is making me feel that bit better is the puppy that lies next to me. The new addition to our family only arrived yesterday, but she is already providing comfort and lifting spirits. The presence of pets can often bring a sense of **healing** – emotionally, mentally and even, according to research, physically.

Although, from a Christian perspective, we may associate healing with the obvious physical miracles that Jesus performed, God's healing can also be experienced in so many ways. Whether it be a physical ailment, an emotional upset, a mental difficulty or a spiritual blockage, the power of prayer and the presence of God at work in people's lives holds

Healing isn't necessarily something grand with showy miracles. It can be the day-to-day small workings of God as He leads us on a journey into a life of wholeness with Him. So often, simply receiving God's forgiveness, for example, can free us from that which might otherwise bind us. Or the Spirit's work to ease our emotional load might come through ordinary or unexpected ways. God's healing can often be at a much deeper level than the obvious surface physical. It is not necessarily about getting better, but is an experience leading to an increase in our wellbeing, helping us to be reconciled, and enabling us to better flourish as the people God has made us to be.

The British spiritual writer, Angela Ashwin, writes: "In a sense we all need healing, for each of us is bruised, weary or hurt in some way; those of us who are physically fit stand alongside people who are ill in our common need of God's forgiveness and love."

Some scholars estimate that Jesus spent 70% of his earthly ministry time healing people in various ways. Healing is obviously so much a part of who God is, and, therefore, something that the Church today needs to take seriously. This is why a local healing service is soon to begin. In fact, Tuesday 4th June sees the first of the bi-monthly *Rest & Restore* services to be held in St James' Church, Arnside (more info included below). Why not come along and see what the 'God that heals' has in store for you?

Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.






