Well, we're nearly there. The official first day of spring is Tuesday 19th March. Spring really is just around the corner and the signs of spring are all around us. Having the ability to be hopeful is surely a gift. Hope is our defence against what is happening around us. Hope puts us back in control when everything feels out of control. Hope has the power to stimulate us to make challenges and instigate changes for a better future.



Being hopeful should not be dismissed as simply looking at life through rose coloured spectacles. Being hopeful doesn't mean engaging in wishful thinking or blind optimism. Hope is not a child like view of the world or an illogical belief that all will be fine. Hope is about looking clearly at what is happening and believing that we, and/or others, have the ability to make things better. Hope is powerful in a world of great uncertainty. Hope gives us a new and uplifting road to walk along. Hope is a new beginning, a new journey, a new destination. It's a better and more productive way of thinking.

Desmond Tutu was one of the world's most prominent spiritual leaders and after facing immense challenges in his life he was able to describe hope as 'being able to see that there is a light despite all the darkness.'

Spring is a time of hope and new beginnings, Spring is known as the season of hope because it symbolises the resurgence of life after the inevitable challenges of winter. Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

The origin of the word 'Lent', the liturgical season that we journey through this month, takes its name from the Old English word meaning 'to lengthen'. As we see the signs of Spring appearing, the hours of sunlight increasing and the days steadily getting brighter we are each invited on the journey, once again, to Easter.

We might equally understand or frame this theme of 'lengthening' in Lent in terms of 'growing' or 'stretching'. And the tenor and theme of our Lenten observance is to just that; opening our hearts and minds to God in hope that through these days we might learn to be his people once again.

Lent can, quite understandably, feel like a time in the Church's year when we are stretched. When we are urged to contemplate our relationship with the Lord, with both discipline and thoughtfulness, as we look to remembering again the events of Jesus' passion and death. Though the Bible tells us that the way of the cross is, despite appearances to the contrary, the way of life and health and peace; it is not a comfortable path to tread.

The events of Holy Week draw us into a drama of betrayal, pain, loss, abandonment and bereavement, in which we see plainly and honestly how God has chosen to interact with us and make himself known. Sharing the full reality of our human experience, even to the grave and gate of death. A story which can help us gain perspective on our own experiences and so know God's presence close when we are confronted with sadnesses and difficulties, comforted by the knowledge that we don't face them in our own strength.

Just as Jesus, at the beginning of his ministry, was driven out in the wilderness; Lent compels us to open ourselves to a bigger and better vision of God and his loving purposes. Thereby helping us, through the work of the Holy Spirit, to open ourselves to the voice of the Lord who persistently calls us out from our old ways of living and being into the people he knows us and wants us to be. Understood in this way, Lent becomes a time both of growth and renewal. A season not only for deepening our own faith and understanding, but also for growing into greater awareness and commitment to the things of God.

As one old hymn puts it:

'Forgive the sin that we have wrought; increase the good that we have sought; that we, at length, our wanderings o'er, may please thee here and evermore.'

Of course, our wanderings in Lent have but one destination, namely the empty tomb of Jesus. That place where all things are made new and we see love's redeeming work perfected in the power, life and transforming glory of the resurrection. In and through the one who, as the book of Revelation tells us, once was dead but is now alive forevermore. It is this hopeful assurance that enables and encourages us to keep Lent faithfully and fruitfully.

I pray it will be so for us all.

Would you like to have a say in the running of our church?

Then please think about volunteering as a Churchwarden or Parochial Church Council member!

This year we are in an unusual situation where several posts will become vacant at the Annual Parish Meetings on Sunday 14th April, due to current post-holders having extended their normal term during the pandemic. All three churchwardens - Dianne, Brian and Jenny - will be stepping down; Elizabeth Rocke will be standing down as PCC Secretary; Sue Smalley will be standing down as Safeguarding Officer; and three PCC members will reach the end of their term

The three Churchwardens are elected by members of the parish each year. They are active members of the congregation and automatically become ex officio members of the PCC. Churchwardens are elected for one year only (but can be re-elected if they wish up to a maximum of 6 years)

PCC members are elected by members of the church electoral roll. The PCC is collectively responsible for the care of the church and the finances, and meets 6 times a year. Members are elected for a term of 3 years. The role of **PCC Secretary** is generally allocated to a PCC member at the first meeting of the year

The Safeguarding Officer is an essential role in the life of the church. It is an independent role that does not necessarily require the post-holder to be a member of the PCC

Please do consider if you can assist with any of these roles. All provide a fascinating insight into the working of the church and a rewarding opportunity to help protect and build the future of our church. These posts may seem a little daunting, but they are not as time-consuming as you may think, so do talk to Andrew or the existing post-holders for more details. It is very much about teamwork and remember there will always be someone around to help you!




