"Everything I do, I do it with you"

(misquoting Bryan Adams from 1991)

The prefix com (no, I don't mean dot-com) is used in many words, for example: companion, compassion, combine, commerce, communion, community..... the list could go on.

From what I remember of Latin lessons back in the day (now that really does date me!) the word com was Latin for "with". And, now I come to think of it, comme is French for "with", too!

Take, for example, COMMUNITY. It's especially the case in a small place like Beetham and its environs that, in order to achieve anything of significance, we need to do it TOGETHER - that is, WITH others.

Beetham is a case in point. At the centre of our village is the Church and it, together with the School and the Wheatsheaf, form the nucleus of our community. It is here that people meet one another, do this WITH one another, enjoy life WITH one another.

Inevitably, these things don't just happen. The School depends existentially upon its Staff led by the Headteacher and Governors and with valued assistance from the Parent Community. The Wheatsheaf too is an important meeting place – another hub of community life. The Church, of course, has been there longest of all - not just as a place of worship but also as the centre of the life of the village. In past times, the market took place In the churchyard: the base of the market cross in still visible there.

The Church doesn't just happen – it needs to be kept going. Of course, one may say "Andrew is a young man - that what the Vicar is for" but he is here to lead us, not simply to do it all himself! It's US, the people, our COMMUNITY who must get together and do it WITH each other. We are, thank goodness, blessed with a number of firmly-committed hard-working volunteers. There was almost a crisis at the April Annual Meeting for the election of churchwardens just recently. The three wardens had all "served their time" (and more besides!) and at one time it seemed possible that no one was going to step forward to fill their shoes. They all three seem to do so much!

But it needn't be so. During the pandemic, restrictions on our activities rather condensed the various volunteer rotas - coffee-making, cleaning, reading etc etc - to the point where, instead of the Churchwardens having the responsibility to see that these things all get done, they were increasingly doing it themselves! In more recent, normal times, previous order is being restored! AND, thanks especially to Viv, Theresa and Deborah – we do once more have three nominees to fill the three Churchwarden posts.

A recent article in The Church Times reported:

The Church Buildings Commission survey in the diocese of Norwich discovered that about 100 churches had no recorded churchwardens. In one rural benefice, there were 19 churches, placing "great pressure" on the incumbent, who had three churches with no PCC members, leaving her with sole responsibility for them.

Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

Over the last few years around Easter the BBC has produced a programme called 'Pilgrimage' which invites people (admittedly some more well-known than others) from different walks of life and sends them on a pilgrimage to well-known Christian sites around Europe. Whereas in previous years pilgrims have journeyed to Santiago de Compostela, Rome and Fatima, this year the producers invited the celebrities to journey along the Pilgrim's Way in North Wales. A route beginning in Holywell at the well of St Winifred (a Welsh Christian martyr of the seventh century) and then travelling east to Bardsey Island, the so-called 'island of twenty-thousand saints'.



What makes the programme so fascinating is the window it shines on the spirituality and faith of the pilgrims, who intentionally represent a variety of religious (and non-religious) perspectives. Naturally, this leads to some interesting and diverse conversations, and yet – watching the programme – it is fascinating to see the pilgrims' openness of heart and mind to seeing where the journey will take them, setting aside time for conversations with each other, but also often with God.

In the earliest days of the Church, as we are reminded in the Acts of the Apostles, those who came (eventually) to call themselves Christians, were initially known as those who 'belonged' or who 'followed' 'The Way'. From the very beginning there was a sense that the Christian community understood itself to be part of something that was dynamic and unpredictable and, quite literally, 'on the move'. They recognised that to live one's life in responses to the promises of God, and particularly, the good news that the early Church proclaimed had been seen so clearly in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, was to join a movement. A movement that in centuries past, and still today, has the power to bring about transformation, that changes lives and, in doing so, changes the world

The ability of the Christian community, in every place and time, to do this isn't based on its material success, status or social pre-eminence (even if sometimes the Church has wrongly prioritised these things), but rather on the hope it seeks to live out of and the message it has been commissioned to proclaim. In the stories we find in the gospels of the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus, we are reminded repeatedly that those he encountered didn't naturally find it hard to believe what they were seeing. Whether it's the women at the empty tomb, the bewildered travellers on the road to Emmaus, or the disciples cowering behind locked doors in Jerusalem, the Bible doesn't shy away from showing us that believing is sometimes difficult. And that, whatever our age or stage of life, the secret of faith is a willingness to open out hearts to the possibility of what God can, will and does do.

The Victorian writer, G.K. Chesterton, commenting on the ups and downs of Christian history, once wrote:

'Christendom has had a series of revolutions and in each one of them Christianity has died. Christianity has died many times and risen again; for it had a God who knew the way out of the grave.'

I pray that as you journey through the month ahead, you may know God's guidance and grace, know the joy of his risen presence, and so find faith to continue, or perhaps to start, walking in his way.


