SUMMER OF LOVE ~ 'MUSIC IS THE STRONGEST FORM OF MAGIC '...

I have never been to a music festival, well not in the conventional form. Then again is there anything conventional about them. I do know a little about them, from anxiously waiting for news that all was well from the Leeds Festival as young family and their friends attended. There was, I recall, a lot of washing to do and some wardrobe losses. Digging deeper, does five hours of Wagner count? Whilst the bucket and spade is out [it is the summer edition after all] we, along with a very small but determined team, have organised three outdoor festival type events. One was cancelled due to unprecedented rain and cars had to be rescued by tractor. How Glastonbury is that! We learnt a lot then, and raised a lot of money for a very important cause. More importantly we made lasting friends and memories. So that is my experience; any further knowledge and insights come via Zoe Ball on Radio 2, so I thank you Zoe in advance.

Anyway back to festivals and a very brief history. The concept of festivals dates back centuries. Even the earliest form of harvest festivals were large gatherings of farmers and villagers all coming together to celebrate the harvest and give thanks and prepare for the next year. There would indubitably have been music and rain. As the world became more sophisticated [really Tess?], festivals began to take on a more political vibe as far back as the 1940s, consisting mostly of folk music with anti-war themes, understandably. Pete Seegar became the voice of a nation in this manner of raising deep rooted, political concerns via music. This set the tone of festivals going forward.

Here in Blighty, we really got on board the music festival train after The Summer Of Love in 1967. This was a musical explosion where societal norms were pushed aside. Janis Joplin, The Who, Otis Reading and Jimi Hendrix - to name a few - headlined. The sound and messages it created reverberated around the world. Power in music, giving those frustrated with world wide politics a voice. A loud voice!

1968 was when we embraced festival fever, and The Isle of Wight was the venue. The Doors and Joni Mitchell headed the list and played for a modest audience. By 1970 over 600,000 people attended. This proved to be a bit too much, so Parliament banned it as they feared such large numbers of people enjoying themselves would have an adverse impact on the island. But you cannot keep a good thing down and it returned in 2002. Have any of you attended one of these? What a time this must have been, music and history inextricably linked. Music and demonstrations, music and sport, music and war, music and peace, music and prayer...

Time to visit Glastonbury. A place full of mystique, spiritualism and heritage. Originally the Pilton Festival, just over a thousand people attended. Tickets cost just ONE POUND and the nearby farm gave everyone a free bottle of milk. [Thank you Zoe]. It is the epitome of festivals which still holds firm to the original ethos of festivals all those years ago, highlighting current world wide events.

Out of them all, for me, it would have been the Secret Garden Party to which I would have been drawn. Sadly this festival of all things magical and imagined ended in 2017. This was a happy, hippy, magical festival held in the Cotswolds woods. It had no high profile acts or causes. It was driven by peace and love and inclusivity. Best of all it promoted CALM, the Campaign Against Living Miserably. Now regardless of age, musical tastes and political leanings, that is surely something we can get behind. Life is such a gift, to live it miserably is quite the saddest concept. So perhaps we could all have our own Secret Garden Parties, lay in the garden, commune with nature (She who never judges), and feel the summer breeze blowing through the jasmine in your mind.

Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

In this election season I was intrigued (and rather surprised) to receive an e-mail from the Charity Commission reminding me that churches (as charities) cannot give support to a political party. As it happens, I think that such a reminder to be quite helpful, not least given what it means to be part of the Church of England, which throughout the centuries of its existence has attained the rather surprising achievement of holding together (or at least just about) rather than separating into groups of like-minded people.

By virtue of being the established church of the land, the Church of England has long understood its particular vocation to serve the whole nation and every person, regardless of their religious tradition or spiritual affiliation. As a result, the Church exists to be a

Christian presence in every community, loving serving our neighbours in the name of Jesus Christ. To do this is part and parcel of what it means (at its most fundamental) to be a Christian, looking to God – the author, redeemer and sustainer of all there is – for help and hope and seeking, through word and deed, to make his love real and tangible by making his Kingdom known.

For it was towards the revealing of this Kingdom that most of Jesus' teaching, as recorded for us in the gospels, was focused. A Kingdom of justice and mercy, of compassion and grace, of righteousness and equity, where all are awarded rightful honour and value as children of the same heavenly Father. As such, the stories of Jesus' life speak authentically to us of one, who in speaking the truth of God, overturned both social convention and accepted assumption thereby showing us a new way to live and to be. Trusting that his Kingdom is near. It is then no accident that the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples includes the petition 'thy Kingdom come, thy will be done'. Encouraging us to pray daily for strength and wisdom to be guided by what we see and understand to be God's purposes for the world.

One of the most alarming features of the General Election campaign over recent weeks has been the knowledge, following a report for the National Centre for Social Research, that trust and confidence in the United Kingdom's politics and election system is currently at its lowest ebb. And although the reasons for this are no doubt complex, we need to remain on guard against feelings of apathy, disillusionment or feeling that our vote – whichever political party might claim it – does not matter. We all have a voice, and our voices – represented through our choice in this and every election – is of consequence. Placing upon us a burden of responsibility in prayerfully seeking after the good and flourishing of all. And playing our part in looking for the coming of the kingdom of which Jesus spoke in the here and now.

A much-loved hymn written by the nineteenth century priest and poet John Keble ends with this couplet:

"...and help us, this and every day, to live more nearly as we pray."

Words which serve as an encouragement for us, in the midst of our daily living, to pay attention to the ways in which our lives reflect the hopes we offer to God in prayer.

All of us, however intermittently, will pray for lots of things, some of which are definitely affected by the political decisions taken by those whom we elect. It may then be a duty for us, in looking towards this election (in heeding the advice of the hymn) to 'vote more nearly as we pray'. Remembering that our politicians wield authority and power on our behalf, and that it would be uncomfortable to discover we were praying for one thing and voting for something altogether different.

In this, the words of Saint Paul in his letter to the Romans (12.9-10) offer wisdom and guidance for us all:

'Let love be genuine; hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honour.'



BEETHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWSLETTER ~ ISSUE No 51, JUNE 2024

Over recent years, a regular and often dominant feature of parish news has been traffic speeds. In particular this issue has related to the A6 where it passes briefly through the East Ward of our parish with a traffic speed limit of 50mph, although other parts of the parish also suffer from a traffic speed problem albeit to a lesser extent. Concerns about the structure of the Bela bridge, where the A6 passes over the river, led to a major project to improve road safety at this point. The work took many months to complete, during which a temporary traffic speed limit of 30mph was imposed. Though routinely ignored by motorists this reduced limit produced at least some respite for, and was welcomed by, local residents! However, the project is now complete and we have a splendid new and safe superstructure to the bridge. With the project complete the original 50mph speed limit has been automatically restored. The hope now is that the A6 traffic speed limit at Beetham can be permanently reduced to a more tolerable level of say 40mph and the parish council is following the formal and protracted procedure, involving other agencies, needed for this.

Traffic within Beetham village is also a problem. The parish council has undertaken a detailed survey of traffic movements and speeds, which has been forwarded to the appropriate authorities and suggestions for increased traffic calming measures in Church Street, Stanley Street and Leighton Beck Road are under consideration.

Beetham village war memorial is in need of some TLC and a project is underway to deal with this, taking advantage of grants available from the War Graves Commission. Similarly, it is hoped to replace the broken metal gate which currently acts as the entrance from the Stanley Street ginnel into the field and permissive path to Slackhead. Access to the public footpath from Beetham to Hale which is located behind Stanley Street properties is of concern to residents anxious to protect their privacy. The Beetham stocks are an iconic feature of the village and attract visitors from far afield, but their condition has deteriorated badly over the last few years. It now has to be decided what action to take. The options seem to be to repair, replace with new or remove altogether. The parish council would welcome village opinion on this issue and is willing to go along whatever turns out to be he preferred route. Please let Parish Clerk John Scargill have your comments, preferably by email.

Nothing much has been heard recently about the proposed major development at Sandside. Investment by the developers must already be significant and it is assumed that, in due course, they will come back with modified proposals. We will, of course, keep you informed. Similarly, The Ship Inn and its future seems no nearer resolution. Against this there is now a Community Hub at Storth, thanks to a grant from Westmorland & Furness Council (WFC) and the active involvement of local residents.

The first year of WFC as our immediate higher authority is now behind us. The huge task of their taking over responsibility from SLDC has, on the whole, been achieved successfully although not without problems of communication both with and within the new organisation. In a major and very much welcome development for Beetham Parish, WFC has agreed to take over responsibility for all parish street lighting – provision of lighting units together with their maintenance and power supply. This has historically been a large sum in Beetham Parish Council's annual expenditure budget (almost £3,000 or 12% in 2022/23) and has a knock-on effect on precept requirements. This reduced outgoing will enable your parish council to cover its other expenditure inflation increases and even consider some new worthwhile projects whilst holding precept requirements in check.

Beetham Parish Council now has an energetic and focussed group of members – but one vacancy remains in West Ward (Storth/Carr Bank). Anyone who might be interested in joining the team would be most welcome. The next monthly meeting will be held in Storth Village Church, Monday 1st July at 7pm. The long length of these pews also limited the size of room that could house them easily

The rough length can be specified at time of purchase, although it will be dependent on matching the back panels. The pew height is 90cm and the depth is 55cm. The smallest practical length is c.130cm
