

St Michael & All Angels Heating Appeal

This week, the Chancellor of the Diocese granted a faculty (a form of ecclesiastical permission similar to planning permission) for the replacement of our church twin gas boilers. As previously reported in The Gateway the existing boilers are over 25 years old and now obsolete. One boiler is already failing but replacement parts cannot be obtained. Whilst we still have heating at present this could change without notice and, although all those using the church can put on extra layers, the lack of sufficient heating could do considerable damage to the fabric of the church

The first three months of the Heating Appeal has raised £5,009 through events and individual donations. We are indebted to all who have contributed and we will continue to investigate other ways of raising the £30,000 needed. This will include adding to our regular fundraising events as below, and we would be very grateful for your ongoing support. We need to be realistic that we have a long way to go, and at some point we will also need to assess the not insignificant expenditure needed for our Quinquennial (5 year fabric report) repairs. We will continue to explore grant opportunities, but a further consideration on timescale is the possible withdrawal of the 'Listed Places of Worship Scheme' in April 2026 which would have a significant impact on the totals needed to be raised

It is better to light a candle than curse the darkness - Chinese Proverb

Traditionally, Christmas is celebrated for twelve nights, starting on Christmas Day. The evening of the final day of celebrations is called the 'Twelfth Night' and marks the night when Christmas decorations traditionally come down. So, have you ever wondered why the Christmas trees in the church yard of our ancient and beautiful church, St. Michael & All Angels, are still standing and lit up every evening, well after Twelfth Night? Have you ever wondered why our beautiful outside crib stays proudly in place until the 2nd February? If you were to take a quiet moment out of a busy day and go inside the church you would find that the magnificent Christmas tree, beautifully decorated and lighting up the south aisle is still in place and will remain so until the 2nd February. The wonderfully, historic crib, built by the German prisoners of war from Bela Camp in 1946 and given to the vicar and congregation as an expression of gratitude for their 'spirit of Christian brotherhood', is still being displayed in the north aisle. In short, none of these Christmas symbols and decorations will have been removed before 2nd February, even though Twelfth Night is a past memory.

Contrary to popular belief, the feast of Christmas starts around 4 pm on Christmas Eve and continues right through to Candlemas Day on the 2nd February. This year, our Christingle service at St. Michael & All Angels started at 4 pm on Christmas Eve when the church welcomed over 260 children and adults to celebrate the start of Christmas, 2024. Our Christmas season finishes 40 days later with the celebration of Candlemas Day, the day that also marks the midpoint of winter, halfway between the shortest day and the spring equinox.

Candlemas is also known as the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord and commemorates the occasion when the Virgin Mary, in obedience to Jewish Law, went to the temple in Jerusalem 40 days after the birth of her son, Jesus Christ, in order to fulfil the requirements of purification and to present her first born son to God.

There is much folklore associated with Candlemas, none the least relating to the prediction of future weather patterns. In England, one common saying states that 'if Candlemas Day be fair and bright, winter will have another fight, if Candlemas Day brings cloud and St Michael and All Angels, Beetham rain, winter won't come back again.' Let's hope that the weather Candlemas is favourable this coming Candlemas Day. Snowdrops, those brave little blooms, sometimes called the 'Candlemas Flower', were gathered to decorate churches. They were symbols of purity, 'the snowdrop in purest array, first rears its head on Candlemas Day.'

(You're, apparently, in the small percentage of those who carry on after the first 2 weeks in January.) I imagine your resolutions are very worthwhile and I encourage you in them. However, I'm also here to say – especially if you didn't make any resolutions or you've 'given up' already... Don't worry!

Beetham Church Electoral Roll 2025 <u>6 yearly revision</u>

There will be a complete revision of the Church Electoral Roll this year. Registration entitles you to vote at the Annual Church meetings each year and to be eligible to stand for the Parochial Church Council and other church and Diocesan bodies

Even if you are already registered names are not automatically carried forward this year, and living in the Parish or regularly attending church does not register you on the new roll unless you fill in a form and return it to the electoral roll officer, Jenny Marks, by Sunday 6th April.

Annual Beetham Church Meetings 2025

The Annual Vestry Meeting will be held on Sunday 11th May, to elect three churchwardens. This will be immediately followed by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, where reports will be given on all the church activities from the previous year, and PCC and Deanery Synod members will be elected

Reports will be collated and the full Church Annual Report & Accounts issued ahead of the APCM. Paper copies will be available for collection at the back of church and an online version will be available on the website

Would you like to have a say in the running of our church? If so, you may be interested in one of the following roles:-

Three churchwardens are elected at the Annual Vestry Meeting by members of the parish in April each year, and are the Bishops local representatives. They are the senior lay people in the parish, active members of the congregation, and ex officio members of the PCC. Churchwardens stand for election every year

PCC members are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting by members of the church electoral roll. The PCC is collectively responsible for the care of the church and the finances, and members represent both the church and the parish at our 6 PCC meetings each year. PCC members are elected for a term of 3 years

The **PCC Secretary** takes minutes of the PCC and Standing Committee meetings, and circulates correspondence. The Secretary does not have to be an elected PCC member



Eco-friendly tips

We were delighted last year to be awarded the Bronze level A Rocha Eco Church Award. This year we are working towards the Silver Award. Being Eco-friendly is not as difficult as you might



imagine and a series of tips will be published in The Gateway over the coming months that can easily be applied at home, and help to save you money as well as helping the environment

Keeping Warm

Make sure you close your curtains when it gets dark to stop heat escaping.

Get draft proof to stop losing heat. Professional draughtproofing of windows, doors and blocking cracks in floors and skirting boards can cost around £200, but can save around £25 a year on energy bills. DIY draught proofing can be much cheaper. Installing a chimney draught excluder could save around £15 a year as well.

Make sure your hot water tank is insulated with a thick jacket. It will save you lots of money not to mention reducing your carbon emissions.

Has your loft got loads of insulation? It's one of the cheapest and easiest ways to save energy and will pay for itself in hardly any time

In The Kitchen

Do not put warm or hot food into the fridge or freezer as this will make the fridge work extra hard to try and keep it cold; always allow food to cool down first.

The location of your fridge can make a difference in how energy efficient it is. Make sure it is out of direct sunlight and not close to the oven. Make sure that there is a small space all around the fridge so that air can circulate.

Use a bowl to wash up rather than a running tap and save £25 a year in energy bills.

When making a cup of tea, only boil the amount of water that you need. You waste electricity (and money) heating water vou won't use.

Use your food waste bin and help to generate green energy. Recycling just 6 tea bags creates enough energy to boil the kettle for another cup of tea. One banana peel could charge your phone twice.

Stop using aluminium foil for cooking wherever possible; use a container with a lid that can be reused. Aluminium is a rare metal and its extraction and purification uses a lot of energy.











Since returning to school after Christmas we have had great success in our cross country. Three of our children were selected to represent the local area at the South Lakes final where two qualified for the Cumbria trials. Harriet secured 5th position in her race and unfortunately Olivia M was injured during her event so had to pull up from her 4th place.

Our minibuses are now in regular use taking Class 2 and Year 1 swimming each Tuesday. We also have some amazing trips planned in the future.

Preschool for 2-year-old children has been really successful since we set up in September. We have now extended the number of days we are providing the provision to full time as well as the number of children we can cater for. If you do know of anyone who is interested in places in our preschool or any other classes within school then please pass on our details.

In the upcoming issues I thought I would tell you a little more about some of the subjects that we teach at Beetham. This month I have picked computing as our focus.

Computing

We are very fortunate to have a class set of chromebooks in school. We also have iPads, Beebots and Microbits as well as data logging equipment.

Children throughout the school have access to technology on a regular basis with children in Reception to Year 6 having at least a weekly computing lesson. Children are taught to use technology for a variety of purposes. We use publishing equipment to make posters and information sheets; spreadsheets to calculate budgets; databases to store, sort and find information; and applications to create pictograms and bar charts. Topics also include photography; where children take, upload and edit photographs linking to our artwork; animation where children recently retold the Nativity story; video recording and editing; and website design.

Further to this, children also use coding to control equipment such as Beebots and code mice. This progresses on to using an application called Scratch Junior to design multiple choice guizzes with programmed answers and then on to Scratch when children design games with more complex codes using blocks.


Class 3 have recently created their own pedometers using our Microbits. This involves creating block or java code, downloading on to their Microbit and then test out their codes.

Computing is an ever-changing subject and as such we work hard to ensure that we prepare the children for the world outside of school; this includes online safety. Online safety is taught to each class weekly as part of our computing lessons as well as our PSHE. We also complete activities on Safer Internet Day which this year is February 11th.

In our weekly online safety session children cover topics such as staying safe online, online bullying, online reputations and self-image and identity.

As you can see our children get regular computing lessons which cover a variety of skills to help prepare them for life outside of school as well as their next step in education.







Following an enjoyable visit last year, twelve members of Beetham WI returned to Holgates, Silverdale this month for an afternoon social event playing bowling. A good time was had by all with lots of laughter and followed by an essential coffee and cake in the cafe!

Our next monthly members meeting is a talk by Sinead McCann about the social enterprise 'Growing Well'. This will be held on Thursday February 13th 2-4 pm at the Wheatsheaf in Beetham. Visitors are welcome to attend (entry charge £3 to include a hot drink).
