Beetham Church PoW Nativity Crib

Last year I was delighted to receive, out of the blue, a message from Rolf Baumann. His father, Bruno Baumann, was one of the German PoWs at Bela Camp in 1946 who had constructed the Christmas Crib and presented it with thanks to the people of Beetham Church. Each Christmas since then, the crib has been on display throughout the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany seasons. Remembering the spartan circumstances which the men endured, and the primitive tools and materials at their disposal, it is truly remarkable that the crib was crafted and painted so skilfully, creating such a beautiful finished product. In 2021, thanks to the generosity of a number of local people, we were able to have the crib professionally restored in the confident hope that it will remain in good condition for many more years to come.



In reply to Rolf's communication, I was able to send some information to him and his wife Gabi at their home in Wilhelmshavn. I included a copy of the "Reconciliation" booklet produced from the research by Sandy Lofthouse into the Bela Camp which makes reference to the Crucifix carved by Bruno Baumann and presented to the Reverend Macleod Murray in thanks for his Christian ministry to the German men in those difficult times.

This year we again exchanged messages and cards, as below:

Dear Rolf and Gabi

Advent Greetings from Beetham! It was good to receive your message - thank you! We were of course thinking of your father and his workmates as last week we once again assembled the Christmas Crib. This will be 78 years since it was presented by your father to the people of Beetham, and the crib will remain on display until Candlemas (2nd February). You would of course be made to feel very welcome indeed if you were to visit us here. Or if travelling is easier in the summer months, we would bring your father's crib out of storage for you to admire his wonderful workmanship and skill! Your photos have just now arrived - it is good to see such positive outcomes from such a dark and tragic period of our history. John

Dear John!

Enjoy a wonderful Advent Season at Beetham together with your wife. I myself am just rather busy with the illness representation of our city organist at the "Banter Kirche" at Wilhelmshaven till the end of January and it's a good feeling of helping our church. Have a good time, and: I'll never forget your goodness of sending me invaluable information about my father's crib and his crucifix!

For now the bible words "Peace on earth and good will to men" shall illuminate our world of darkness and wars... You and the Beetham Church crib community show (now for 78 years) that there is a chance of overcoming the darkness and

Postscript

Just before Christmas, Revd Andrew received an email from Rolf's brother, Eric. Rolf had shown Eric the Christmas card depicting the Nativity Crib that John had kindly sent to him this year. Eric was keen to purchase more copies of the card. It was too late for them to arrive in Germany before Christmas, but we were delighted to receive this response from Eric this

Dear Jenny, thank you so very much for the cards which arrived here on Friday! I am sure you can imagine how touching it is to see that something my father made - or helped making, so many years ago, is still around. When my brother started investigating and writing emails to Reverend Norman, he always told me when he had found out something new, and we both agreed that our father would have been very pleased! As a child, I was often told about the crib and we had a black and white photograph of it and of the accompanying inscription. For my father, this was the beginning of a lifelong artistic occupation with woodcarving as a hobby. From where I am writing, I can see a 50 cm high statue of Christophorus which he made in the 1950s. My father remembered his time as a POW fondly. Even if he was separated from his family, he was safe and from what he told me he was being treated friendly.

Ring out, wild bells

Ring out, wild bells, to the wild sky, The flying cloud, the frosty light: The year is dying in the night; Ring out, wild bells, and let him die.

Ring out the grief that saps the mind, For those that here we see no more; Ring out the feud of rich and poor, Ring in redress to all mankind.

For centuries, church bells have been rung to mark momentous events and occasions. Here at St Michael & All Angels, our venerable bells, three of which date back to the 17th century, have pealed in recent years to commemorate



significant national, local and personal events, as well as to summon the faithful to worship. The Centenary of the 1918 Armistice; anniversaries of key moments in the Second World War (VE Day and VJ Day); HM Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee; the Queen's funeral and the coronation of King Charles, to name but a few. And on a more personal level, to mark the loss of friends and to pay tribute to happy memories of good times spent in their company.

Alfred Lord Tennyson's poem, In Memoriam, from which the verses at the top of the page are taken, was written after the death of his closest friend, Arthur Hallam. Tennyson chose the ringing of bells as a metaphor for the eternal circle of life because of the ancient tradition of church bells ringing at the turn of the year to see out the old and to usher in the new, and to reflect his own feelings of loss and renewal. 'Ring out the grief that saps the mind, For those that here we see no more', he wrote.

Tennyson, like his contemporary Charles Dickens, was also only too well aware of the social and political ills of the mid-nineteenth century and despaired at the inequalities and unfairness in society which affected the lives of ordinary people. In his poem, he juxtaposes an outpouring of his personal grief with an expression of his deeply felt conviction that the birth of Jesus had ushered in the hope of redemption and a better future for mankind.

At the start of a new year, we are all led to look both forward and backward, at what is past and to what is to come. January takes its very name from the Roman God of transitions Janus, who, with two heads, could look in both directions at the same time. And so we ring out the old, leaving our regrets, our failures, our disappointments, behind us as we attempt to ring in the new, making our resolutions based in hope for the future. It is not quite so easy to 'Ring out the grief that saps the mind, For those that here we see no more', but we, together with Tennyson, can hope that the promise of Christ's birth in Bethlehem will help to 'Ring in redress to all mankind'.

As we enter 2025, we know we cannot change the past, nor can we predict with any certainty what is to come. What we can do is to reflect from time to time on the true significance of the birth of the baby in a stable in a small town in a foreign land, and look forward with hope for the future.



Letter from The Revd Andrew Norman

Dear friends,

I am writing this on the fifth day of Christmas and whilst I haven't received the gift of 'five gold rings' from my 'true love', the month of January is now looming. The beginning of a new year steadily approaching meaning, no doubt, that we'll all be considering the possibilities and the perils that may lie ahead of us as we journey through 2025.

Although for many the time for the singing of carols has concluded, the Church in bidding us celebrate the message and good news of Christmas for forty days continues to invite us to rejoice. To remember the hope that 'God is with us' as we now look to all that will come, bidden and unbidden, in the days, weeks and

Although for some this might seem quite fantastical, this is the claim that the Christian faith continually encourages us to consider. To stretch our imagination, to enlarge our understanding, to believe the truth that we can reckon as credible God's desire to know us and to be known by us. And so - however hesitatingly or uncertainly - to know for ourselves his loving purposes towards us. Not a magical tonic that will take away our griefs or sadnesses, not an optimistic wishfulness that means that we'll be spared challenge or discomfort, but an awareness that means we can embrace life with a hopefulness and a trust born of knowing that we journey in God's company and fellowship.

In concluding these thoughts and in looking ahead to the New Year, I leave you with some words (when looking back on his life) of the thirty-ninth President of the United States of America, Jimmy Carter, whose passing was announced as I sat down to write these words. They remind us, from one who lived a life of fruitful service, that faith in God much always be consequential; changing who we are and how we are with others. As 2025 begins, may we all be given help and grace to give faith a chance and, in doing so, to make a difference in the year that is to come.

'I have one life and one chance to make it count for something...I'm free to choose what that something is, and the something I've chosen is my faith. Now, my faith goes beyond theology and religion and requires considerable work and effort. My faith demands - this is not optional - my faith demands that I do whatever I can, wherever I am, whenever I can, for as long as I can with whatever I have to try to make a difference.'

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BEETHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWSLETTER ISSUE No 52, DECEMBER 2024

Traffic speeds in our parish continue to be a problem and a major safety concern, particularly where the A6 passes through Beetham. Despite this, getting something done about the issue is not straightforward due to the many agencies involved. Nevertheless, your councillors are persisting in pressing for action based on the findings of a comprehensive study. Based on this study, a detailed report has been prepared and circulated amongst those agencies and positive action is hoped for in 2025, in particular aimed at reducing permitted speed limits on the relevant section of the A6

During recent months there has been progress with various projects. Soundings amongst residents in Beetham village showed a clear majority in favour of retaining its iconic stocks and undertaking the work necessary to make them safe. This work has now been completed using the Parish Council's own resources; whether the stocks are put back into their original intended use remains to be seen! Finding a firm competent (and willing) to undertake extensive renovation of the Beetham war memorial has been surprisingly difficult. However, Parkin & Jackson of Kendal have now agreed to take this on, starting in the new year. This is an important matter and it is reassuring that we can now expect a satisfactory outcome.

Another project, to relocate the original Storth water pump to a new and more prominent site in the village, is ongoing. The art content of the BPC information board on Storth Green has deteriorated badly and needs to be replaced - an existing detailed sketch plan of the village has been suggested as a suitable alternative. Also under consideration is the idea from a resident to install a pictorial information panel showing in outline the view north from Sandside, for which a suitable site along the A5282 would need to be found. Sponsorship funding for this project is being actively sought.

As you will be aware, the Parish Council owns and is responsible for a number outdoor seats at many locations in the parish, many of which were donated by relatives in memory of departed loved ones. There is also a lengthy list of other 'outdoor furniture' items which need to be regularly assessed and maintained, involving significant annual expense. Bus shelters are some of the most costly items and there are three of these, of which one (at Green Lane end) is in a bad state of repair. Discussions are ongoing about what action to take here.

Reseeding has been successfully completed at one of the two Parish Council-owned plots of land following damage by unauthorised parking of motor vehicles. River pollution is currently a matter of serious concern and Beetham Parish Council has agreed to join the parish councils of Arnside and Milnthorpe in expressing this concern when and wherever appropriate.

At its meeting on 2 December 2024, your parish council approved its financial budget for 2025/26 which requires a precept from Westmorland and Furness Council of £25,723, which is in line with the previous year.

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

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
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
