How and Why?

I suspect we are all guilty at times of taking things for granted more than we perhaps should. Perhaps we miss out by not finding out. Sometimes when I ask lots of questions, I am reminded of a verse by Rudyard Kipling:

*I keep six honest serving-men
(They taught me all I knew);
Their names are What and Why and When
And How and Where and Who.*

In early April this year we saw the Artemis II mission, which provided incredibly spectacular pictures of both earth and moon as seen from space. I also noted that re-entry to the earth's atmosphere reached speeds of nearly 25,000 miles per hour. That seems really fast, but is a bit difficult to visualise. It actually works out to nearly 7 miles per second, which really made me think.



On August 12th we had the solar eclipse, which proved to be a profoundly moving moment for many.



On September 23rd this year we shall have the autumn equinox, which marks the point when day and night are equal in length. As such, it also marks the end of summer and the beginning of autumn.

Each of these events causes me to wonder a little more about the earth and our relationship with both sun and moon. And how do we predict all the regular planetary movement within the universe? The sheer scale of it all is truly mind-boggling and something we could easily take for granted without really wondering what it's all about. I recently found this nugget written by a relatively unknown amateur astronomer:

*I often think about the sun
And all the planets in the sky
And when the world was first begun
And then I wonder. How? And Why?*

Plenty of people have posed theories as to how the universe was formed, but far fewer as to why. Either it's all a huge accident, or it isn't. The church does offer answers to lots of the really big questions about life and existence, even if many of life's mysteries still remain. Come along to Beetham Church if you'd like to find out more. As well as the traditional Sunday services each week (although Sunday 13th September is at Arnside as one of the quarterly joint services for our local churches), we also have Coffee Mornings on the first Tuesday of each month. Each occasion generates lots of conversation and laughter on all sorts of subjects, both great and small, whether that be recipes, favourite places, cricket, Tour de France tactics, or if talking to plants really does make a difference.

Happy September everyone, and keep curious.

Letter from the Curate

As I sit down to write this, I'm enjoying the feeling of having just witnessed a once-in-a-generation event. 12th August saw a solar eclipse that crossed parts of the northern hemisphere with much of Europe experiencing a partial if not full eclipse.

The rather beautiful eclipse (even if more beautiful on the video footage online than in the somewhat cloudy Arnside) highlighted just how dependent our world is on light. For a short time, the moon came between us and the sun, and daytime became strangely dim. The sun had not disappeared - it was still shining – the moon could not blot out the light completely - but our view of it was temporarily obscured.

There is something wonderfully Christian in that image. The opening of the Gospel of John contains these words -

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1.5)

We live in a world where it can sometimes seem as though the light of God is being eclipsed. The news brings us stories of wars and suffering, political uncertainty, extreme climate concerns and divisions within all manner of communities. Closer to home, people may be carrying private worries that nobody else can see. At times, faith itself can feel dim or distant. But an eclipse reminds us that although something may be hidden, it doesn't mean it isn't there.

The sun may sometimes be hidden from our sight, but it continues to shine. As does the Son of God. Jesus Christ describes himself as the 'Light of the world', and is recorded to have said later in John's Gospel...

Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life. (John 8.12)

The Christian life is not exempt from darkness. Rather, the hope of the Christian faith is that darkness doesn't have the final word, and that light shines more powerfully.

Perhaps that is a helpful thought as September begins. We may not be able to control everything that happens in the world around us at this time or what the coming (academic) year will hold, but we can choose where we look for light. So, as we begin a new season - as the nights draw in and the days lose some of their light - may we remember that Christ's light is not overcome by any shadows. It remains faithful and strong no matter what our life circumstances.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

As well as making a difference to the brightness of the lighting around all areas of the church it is hoped that the change will also help to reduce our electricity bills and reduce our carbon footprint.

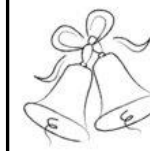
If you have not already switched to LED bulbs at home this would be a good time to change ahead of the dark winter nights.

Pulling out all the stops

A 'stop' can be found on an organ and each stop covers different pipes and sounds. Using a stop enables an organist to turn off (literally 'stop') air getting into a particular pipe and therefore control many combinations of sounds. Pulling out all the stops allows the maximum air into the pipe, giving the powerful richness of music often associated with church organs. Nowadays the phrase has become a common expression to refer to maximising impact.

A recent survey of pipe organs identified that sadly 5 church organs are being removed every week, and a further 4 each week are no longer played. In 1915 there were 40,000 pipe organs. There are now less than 15,000 working pipe organs in Britain and only half in regular use, as organists and organ tuners become more scarce and churches close.

Surprisingly, the organ is also responsible for the phrase *'bells and whistles'*, originating from complex theatre organs imitating many different musical instruments. Bells themselves have given rise to many common expressions ~ *rings a bell*, *with bells on*, *clear as a bell*, *as sound as a bell*, and *going like the clappers* to name but a few.

Like the organ, bellringing is also an ancient musical art most commonly associated with churches. Here at Beetham we are very lucky to have a ring of six towerbells, and a set of 37 handbells, all in good working order and regular use. We enjoy ringing for many different occasions ~ most recently on the towerbells for Noun and Blake's lovely wedding in August, and on the handbells for the residents and staff at Elmsfield House ~ and we are about to start practicing for Christmas!

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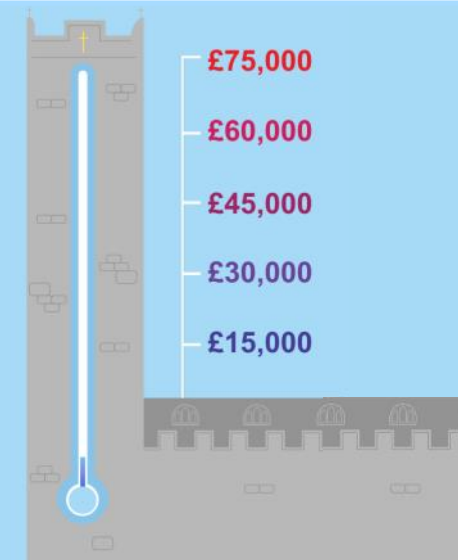
